Bulb and E-scrap Collection

Paducah Power System will hold a fluorescent bulb and electronic scrap collection next month as part of our observance of Public Power Week. Every year, public utilities across the country observe Public Power Week as a way to highlight the benefits of public power. Community involvement and support is one of those benefits.



The collection will be Monday, October 2 from 7AM until 4PM at our building at 1500 Broadway. McCracken County residents may drop off, at no cost, old fluorescent tubes and compact fluorescent bulbs. We will also accept the following electronic waste: personal computers, laptops, small printers, DVD players, VCRs and televisions. We will not accept large loads of electronic waste from commercial entities or recyclers. This is a residential collection.



Clean Earth, Inc. of Calvert City, a hazardous waste disposal company, will properly dispose of the bulbs and e-scrap. Last year's collection yielded 55 pallets of e-scrap.

Beware of 3rd Party Payments

PPS customers sometimes pay their Paducah Power bill through a third party such as Walmart, Kroger or Western Union. When doing so, customers should remember that there is a delay, sometimes as much as a few days, before PPS receives that payment and can credit it to an account. That could result in a penalty or disconnection if the payment is not received on time. However, payments made at the PPS kiosks at the south side Walmart and Banks Market in Lone Oak are real time payments. If your bill is due immediately, we recommend that you pay your bill at a kiosk, through our webpage, at our offices or over the phone.

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PPS Board Names Carroll General Manager



The Paducah Power System Board of Directors has chosen David Carroll as the utility's new General Manager. The board, last month, approved a three-year contract for Carroll who had been serving as the acting general manager since the May resignation of Gary Zheng.

Carroll has worked as the Director of Finance at PPS for nineteen years, overseeing Accounting, Customer Service and Consumer Billing, and

serving as the utility's power supply and sales analyst during the past three years. Carroll was instrumental in developing and implementing strategies that have lowered PPS's Power Cost Adjustment and significantly improved the utility's finances. He also negotiated a ten-year capacity contract with Kentucky Municipal Energy Agency.

"We had five excellent finalists," said PPS Board Chair Hardy Roberts. "But the optimal choice was the person who best knows this company and the unique challenges we face. Dave has been key to our financial recovery during the past three years and to the development of relationships we believe could help to resolve our power generation issues."

Carroll said, "I was born and raised here. This is my hometown, and I want to follow through on the strategies we developed while Gary was here, achieve permanent rate relief and make this utility the best it can be for my community."

Prior to coming to Paducah Power, Carroll was the Chief Financial Officer for Bechtel Jacobs Company's Paducah site and an Accounting Manager and Finance Officer for Lockheed Martin Energy Systems.

Carroll's appointment was immediate.
